### PRINCIPAL'S WELCOME

Dear Parents/carers and families

Welcome to the second edition of our newsletter for this academic year. It has been a jam packed eight weeks of academic work and wider opportunities and enrichment experiences for our students, the highlights of which have featured in this edition. Staff are very proud of how students have conducted themselves and their engagement.

Behaviour and uniform have been good over the long half term. Before we break up for the half term holiday, students will receive reminders about how to stay safe and conduct themselves appropriately during this time, and we will carry our 'start of the new half term behaviour training' with students upon their return.

### **Homework**

Thank you for supporting our push on homework and home learning this half term. It is essential that students in all year groups develop excellent study habits. These habits start in year 7, so by the time they reach years 10 and 11 they can cope very well with the demands of the GCSE courses. We want our students to be able to excel academically and achieve a good set of examination results in year 11. We expect years 7, 8 and 9 to be carrying out at least 45 minutes of homework per subject every 2 weeks, and years 10 and 11 to be carrying out at least one hour of homework per subject per week. Year 11 should be studying in earnest for their GCSE mock exams, which start on Monday 13th November.



### **BRONZE AWARD YEAR 9**

### WHAT IS THE DOFE AWARD?

A life-changing experience. A fun time with friends. An opportunity to discover new interests and talents. A tool to develop essential skills for life and work. A recognised mark of achievement; respected by employers.

The DofE is many things to many people, supporting generations to successfully navigate adult life.

14–24-year-olds can do a DofE programme at one of three progressive levels which, when successfully completed, leads to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

There are four awards to complete at Bronze and Silver level and five at Gold. They involve helping the community/environment, becoming fitter, developing new skills, planning, training for and completing an expedition and, for Gold only, working with a team on a residential activity.

Any young person can do their DofE – regardless of ability, gender, background or location. Achieving an Award isn't a competition or about being first. It's all about setting personal challenges and pushing personal boundaries.

Through a DofE programme, young people have fun, make friends, improve their self-esteem and build confidence. They gain essential skills and attributes for work and life such as resilience, problem-solving, team-working, communication and drive, enhancing CV's and university and job applications. Top employers recognise the work-ready skills the award holders bring to their business/place of work.

We are excited for our 14 year 9 students, who have signed up for the award. Save the date: 10<sup>Th</sup> November for your first meeting.

### WHAT IS IT?

Well known throughout the world, Harvey Ball, a commercial artist from Worcester, Massachusetts created the smiley face in 1963. That image went on to become the most recognizable symbol of good will and good cheer on the planet.

As the years passed Harvey Ball became concerned about the over-commercialisation of his symbol, and how its original meaning and intent had become lost in the constant repetition of the marketplace.



Out of that concern came his idea for World Smile Day®. He thought that we, all of us, should devote one day each year to smiles and kind acts throughout the world. The smiley face knows no politics, no geography and no religion.

He declared that the first Friday in October each year would henceforth be World Smile Day®. Ever since that first World Smile Day® held in 1999, it has continued every year in Smiley's hometown of Worcester, MA and around the world.

After Harvey died in 2001, the Harvey Ball World Smile Foundation was created to honour his name and memory. The Foundation continues as the official sponsor of World Smile Day® each year.

### PARENT PAY ADVANCE NOTICE

We are really pleased to announce a workshop for years 7-10 from medical mavericks Friday 9th February 2024. If your child loves science or is thinking of a career in the medical world this workshop is just for them.

## What are medical mavericks and what do they do?

At Medical Mavericks they are opening the door to the world around the students - just enough so they can get a tantalising taste that will drive their ambition and inspire them to find out more. If they want it, they will kick down the door to open it further and do whatever it takes to run through it into a world they never thought possible.

Medical mavericks will give students the opportunity to use a variety of equipment including:

### 1. Ultrasound Machine

Students love using the ultrasound to scan their radius and ulna bones in their arm to search for their growth plates!



### 2. iPhone Retina Scan

This is a great activity that mixes Ophthalmic Science, Medical Engineering and Computer Science! Using an Ophthalmoscope attached to an iPhone, it can take a picture of students' retinas! Students get to see their optic disc and blood vessels that are less than 1mm in diameter!



3. Record and Print

### an ECG

Students can record their very own Electrocardiogram and print a copy off to take home and stick on their fridge!

They'll get to see their P,Q,R,S & T waves! On the back of the printout is a mini poster of all the NHS career sectors they can explore after the workshop



### 4. Take Blood from Andy!




OK, OK... students are not taking blood from a real person called Andy! But students do get to use a REAL needle to take fake blood from a phlebotomy training arm that is called Andy!

It is all done under supervision in small groups, so it is all performed in a controlled environment.

5. Try Keyhole Surgery


This activity is all performed in the safety of a special box!

Students can use laparoscopic instruments to complete simple tasks like threading string and stretching elastic bands, whilst viewing their actions through a tablet camera. It isn't as easy as it looks!



6. Infrared Vein

### **Scanner**



Using some very cool medical physics we can project an image of your veins onto your skin by scanning them with infrared light!

The way your body absorbs and reflects back the infrared light, changes the wavelength of the light which is picked up by the scanner and turned into the projected image you see on your skin!

If your child would like to participate in Medical Maverick's, Parent Pay will open 9am on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> November. The cost of the workshop will be £8 per student. If your child receives free school meals the workshop will be subsidised and parents will only be required to pay £5.

### ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Attendance and punctuality have a high profile at our academy and there is a whole academy approach to ensuring all students are attending every day to take advantage of excellent opportunities and prepare them for their lives beyond school.

Attainment is strongly linked to attendance and students who miss between 10 to 20% of school (between 19 to 38 days per year) stand only a 35% chance of achieving five or more good GCSEs compared to 72% of those who miss fewer than 5% of school. On average students who miss 17 or more days in a school year lose one full grade in their GCSEs. We are keen to ensure that all students fulfil their

potential at Brownhills. All staff and our lead Attendance Team are keen to work collaboratively with our students and families to ensure all of young people are in lessons every day. We thank you for prioritising your child's attendance during the working week, so they have every chance of being successful in their academic studies.

Clear on the importance of Attendance and Punctuality on Attainment, we are aspirational and believe all students should strive for 100% attendance. Knowing how quickly gaps in learning can occur following periods of absence, we urge parents to support their child to be in school.

# WHAT PARENTS CAN DO TO SUPPORT ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY?

Parents have a legal responsibility to ensure their child attends punctually. Parents should provide the academy with up-to-date information about points of contact and those with 'parental responsibility'.

### HOLIDAYS IN TERM TIME


Leave of absence is not a legal right; whilst absence due to ill health is sometimes unavoidable, a holiday taken during term time is parental choice. The Education (Pupil Registration) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013 prohibits a Headteacher granting leave of absence to a student, except where an application has been made in advance, and the Headteacher considers that there are 'exceptional circumstances' relating to the application.

Please note that if the absence is not authorised, and the holiday is taken, this may result in a Penalty Notice of £120 (or £60 if paid within 21 days) to each parent for each child taken out of school.

### **PUNCTUALITY**

Students should be in school by 8.35am and registration will commence at 8.40am. Any student who arrives after 8.40am will be marked on the register as late using the 'L' (late) code. Students who are persistently late will receive a relevant sanction (Punctuality Sanctions), so please ensure that you encourage your child to arrive to school on time.

Given that Attendance and Punctuality have a high profile within the school community, we are keen to reward students who are punctual and are working towards our aspirational target of 100% Attendance. We regularly review Attendance Commendations based on pupil feedback.



### IN SCHOOL SUPPORT

If pupils are experiencing barriers to attendance, we work with the young person in school to resolve any issues, which may include support from the Heads of Year, Aspirations, Attendance Team, Well Being Counsellors and Child Protection Advocates.

Under existing legislation, parents commit an offence if their child fails to attend regularly, and the absences are classed as 'unauthorised' (those for which the School cannot or has not given permission). Depending on circumstances, such cases may result in prosecution under Section 444 and 444B of the Education Act 1996 which could lead to a fine of £2500 or imprisonment.

A Penalty Notice is an alternative to prosecution which does not require an appearance in court, whilst still securing an improvement in a pupil's attendance. Payment of a Penalty Notice enables parents to discharge potential liability for conviction for the period of absence included in the Penalty Notice.

### SAFETY

For 20 years, FIFA dominated the football video gaming arena, attracting legions of devoted fans and scooping up accolades like a digital Real Madrid. After parting ways with the sport's governing body, however, renowned developers Electronic Arts (EA) have now launched their own individual bid for the title. It's called EA Sports FC 24, and its effectively FIFA 2.0.

Familiar action delivered by the same team, of course, points to a comparable level of popularity – especially among those young gamers raised on the FIFA franchise. As our #WakeUpWednesday guide highlights, however, EA Sports FC 24 also carries many similar risks to its predecessor, including addictive gameplay, abusive voice chats and expensive in-game purchases.



### BROWNHILLS PE DEPARTMENT THIS HALF TERM!

Brownhills PE department has had an excellent start to the first half term back at school! We have offered lots of activities, taken part in fixtures and have represented the school in competitions outside of school!

Firstly, the attendance to our lunch and extra-curricular activities have been some of the best we have seen in a long time! Over 30+ students have been attending clubs such as lunchtime futsal and our new cheerleading club after school which are fantastic enrichment opportunities.

The Year 7 Chess club is thriving at the moment with over 20 students regularly attending every Monday lunchtime in room 47. All Year 7 students are welcome, and help is on hand to show new players how to play with the assistance of Mr Casey and Mr Simmons. Older Academy students can attend Thursday's club, which is also in room 47. Chess leaders will be nominated this month which is part of the Ormiston Academy Chess Leadership program organised by Mr James who is a member of Brownhills' staff and is also the Chess Coordinator for the Trust. ### JOIN THE POLICE CADETS FOR FREE!



What is the Police Cadets Scheme?

The cadet scheme recruits 13-17 year olds from across the West Midlands. They encourage young people from all walks of life to join them.

As part of a national curriculum, police cadets:

- learn about policing, including visits to departments.
- learn new skills and to help others.
- volunteer in the community and help their own personal development.
- take part in events such as Pride or Remembrance Day.

### What is a cadet leader?

- Cadet leaders are volunteers who help run our cadet units. They come from different backgrounds, and you do not have to work for us to apply to be one. All we ask is that you're over 18 and can commit to the role for at least a year.
- After vetting and a disclosure and barring (DBS) check, they will be supported and given you training about how to be a cadet leader.

### A cadet leader should:

- want to inspire others and make a difference to young people.
- have good personal skills and be able to motivate.
- confidence to deliver sessions.
- be able to lead, team build and maintain discipline.

The cadet units normally meet once a week in the early evening school term time at Blue coat school.
