Brownhills Ormiston Academy enters the Guinness Book of World Records.

Ormiston Academies Trust has smashed the **GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS** title for 'The Largest Baking Lesson (Multiple Venues)' with over 700 individual bakers stepping into the kitchen. Students and staff from across our trust celebrated their baking skills, as they were

officially jointly crowned GUINNESS WORLD



RECORD title holders as part of a joint effort in our nationwide baking lesson. Twenty-two of the OAT academies across the England took part in a virtual cooking lesson, with students, academy staff and the central team all putting on their aprons to learn how to create a delicious, recordbreaking mango galette.

This ambitious attempt follows The Great Ormiston Bake competition last year, where over 3,000 pupils competed to take home the prestigious baking title for their

academy. Now, across our trust, we can celebrate together as we are officially confirmed as a part of Guinness World Records history.



Dan Woods, Lead Practitioner for Food, Design and Technology, said:

"We are so proud of all our academies, staff, and students for getting involved with this exciting challenge. It was great to see how much all our bakers across the country enjoyed creating their galettes, and the icing on the cake was to hear the Guinness World Records team confirm that we have officially broken the previous record."

Remembrance Day

At Brownhills Ormiston Academy, students and staff also came together to remember the sacrifice of the armed forces community with a reflective service and wreath-laying.



Brownhills has held an annual Remembrance Day Service for more than 30 years to remember the service men and women who lost their lives during the First World War and in all other wars since.

Those taking part in the remembrance service included all staff and students from the school, representatives from the armed forces, school governors and the executive central team from the academy's sponsoring trust – Ormiston Academies Trust (OAT) and the Lord Mayor of Walsall.



The service closed with local cadets taking the salute and escorting wreaths to the memorial plaque in the Remembrance Quad, which remembers the names of former Brownhills' students who died in the First World War.

Ross Doodson, Assistant Principal at Brownhills Ormiston Academy, said: 'This is truly Brownhills Ormiston Academy at its best; students, staff and members of our community coming together to pay their respects, and honour those that have lost their lives in conflict. We are very proud to uphold this tradition'.

For those who would like to understand more about prejudice and how to report it please read below.



Challenge prejudice today What is prejudice?

Prejudice is when we decide what we think about someone before we've got to know them. Literally we "pre-judge".

It means seeing someone as an image, rather than a person. We assume something bad about them because of *what* they are, rather than understanding *who* they are.

Prejudice is inside all of us. We all make judgements about other people, and sometimes these judgements are unfair. We all need to look at ourselves and admit when we get things wrong.

When people close their minds, their prejudice can get much worse. Under the Nazis, most Germans became so prejudiced against Jewish people that they agreed to them being destroyed. This was the extreme prejudice that led to the murder of 6 million Jews, including Anne Frank.

What is discrimination?

Discrimination is the damage caused by prejudice. When we discriminate against someone, it means we treat them less well than other people because of our prejudice about them. The Nazis discriminated against Anne Frank just because she was Jewish.

What can you do?

Remember your personal safety and wellbeing is of the utmost importance. If you feel that you, or someone you know, are in imminent danger because of a hate crime please dial 999.

If you are experiencing prejudice and/or discrimination, remember that you can talk to a trusted and supportive family member/friend/teacher or you can turn to a charity for help and support.

Mavericks - 9th February 2024

We are really pleased to announce a workshop for years 7-10 from medical mavericks Friday 9th February 2024. If you love science or thinking of a career in the medical world this workshop is just for you.

What are Medical Mavericks and what do they do?

At Medical Mavericks we are opening the door to the world around the students we see, just enough so they can get a tantalising taste that will drive their ambition and inspire them to find out more. If they want it, they will kick down the door to open it further and do whatever it takes to run through it into a world they never thought possible

Medical Mavericks will give students the opportunity to use a variety of equipment including:



1.Ultrasound Machine

Students love using the ultrasound to scan their radius and ulna bones in their arm to search for their growth plates!

2.iPhone Retina Scan

This is a great activity that mixes Ophthalmic Science, Medical Engineering and Computer Science! Using an Ophthalmoscope attached to an iPhone, we can take a picture of their retina!

Your students get to see their optic disc and blood vessels that are less than 1mm in diameter!

3.Record and Print an ECG

Students can record their very own Electrocardiogram and print a copy off to take home and stick on their fridge!

They'll get to see their P,QRS & T waves!

On the back of the printout is a mini poster of all the NHS career sectors they can explore after the workshop

4. Take Blood from Andy!

OK, OK... we are not taking blood from a real person called Andy! But students do get to use a REAL needle to take fake blood from a phlebotomy training arm that we call Andy!

It is all done under supervision in small groups, so it is all performed in a controlled environment.

5.Try Keyhole Surgery

This activity is all performed in the safety of a special box!



Students can use laparoscopic instruments to complete simple tasks threading string and stretching elastic bands, whilst viewing their actions through a tablet camera. It isn't as easy as it looks!

6.Infrared Vein Scanner

OK, I know we said 5, but we can't leave this one out!

Using some very cool medical physics we can project an image of your veins onto your skin by scanning them with infrared light!

The way your body absorbs and reflects back the infrared light, changes the wavelength of the light which is picked up by the scanner and turned into the projected image you see on your skin!

If your child would like to participate in medical maverick's parent pay will open 9am on Monday 6th November at 9am. The cost of the workshop will be £8 per student. If your child receives free school meals the workshop will be subsided and parents will only be required to pay £5.

Getting help over Christmas



Most food banks have different opening hours over Christmas – find out how and where to get help.

Emergency food

Many of our food banks will have different opening hours over the Christmas period, so it's worth checking their website and social media channels for updated information.



If you are in need of emergency food support, you should get in touch with your local food bank. The food bank will be able to explain which referral agency you need to speak to, to get a food voucher. You can then exchange this voucher for a food parcel at your nearest food bank centre.

Where can I get a food bank voucher?

Not all referral agencies (professional organisations who hold food bank vouchers) will be open as normal over the Christmas period. We recommend checking their website, as well as that of your local food bank, to see whether they are open.

If the food bank is open over the festive period, they will be able to tell you which referral agency partners can issue you with a voucher. You can get in touch with your local food bank directly.

Where else can I go for help?

Local charities may be open, including soup kitchens.

Local authority support may be available throughout this period. Please check your local authority website for opening hours.

Your local Salvation Army may be able to help.

Help through Hardship helpline

If you need advice, the Help through Hardship helpline will be open until 5pm on Thursday 21 December. It will re-open at 9am on Tuesday 2 January 2024.
