Principal's Message- Mrs. Lloyd

We have another eventful edition of our newsletter,

which includes some of the curricular, extracurricular and enrichment activities that have taken place over the last few months.

We have had an array of end of term events leading up to the summer holidays including our rewards assemblies for all year groups. Well done to all our students who have received awards for good behaviour, attendance, effort and hard work since Aprilover 80,000 points this year for demonstrating our academy values of Ready, Respect and Safe. This is phenomenal and we are very proud of our students.

Across the curriculum students in all year groups have produced some excellent and high-quality work full of effort and thought. Year 11 students worked very hard during their final exams in May and June. Year 11 students attended extra revision sessions before and after school and during the May half term. Well done to over 350 students who achieved over 95% attendance to the academy over the spring term! The aim for the summer term is for as many students as possible to achieve a 100% attendance record.

For most students the best place to be is in the academy, surrounded by the support of their friends and staff. This is important not just for students' learning, but also for their overall wellbeing, socialisation, wider development and their mental health.

We know that there are times when there are reasons why students have not attended the academy such as:

- Generally feeling unwell/illness
- Medical reasons
- Mental health
- Peer issues
- Transport/uniform issues
- Specific family circumstances

Our academy's aim is to work in partnership with families to find a way to support students to attend every day. So, if there is a reason why a student cannot attend, we strongly encourage parents/carers to get in contact with pastoral staff or the attendance team. Where possible, please ensure that a child attends the academy in the first instance, and we can work together to support them throughout the academy day. Some of the ways that we can support students are:

- Pastoral support from HOY/PSL
- Referral to school counsellor
- Informing class teachers of specific strategies/adaptations to support a child

- Use of our pupil support unit (PSU) for a short period of time (a smaller classroom environment)
- Referral/signpost to further support from outside agencies

What if a student is too ill to attend the academy?

It's usually safe for parents and carers to send their children to the academy with minor illnesses, like colds, a headache, a cough, runny nose or sore throat. If this is the case send the child with a note in their planner or tell them to speak to their Head of Year so that we can plan the best way to support them throughout the day. If necessary, parents/carers can phone the academy too.

We understand that parents/carers know their child best and there will be occasions when a student may need to stay at home and take the time to recover from an illness.

What if my child is too anxious to go to the academy?


Children can sometimes feel worried about going to the academy/ a school. In the main, this is a very normal emotion. It's important to recognise that often going into the academy can help children to feel less worried than letting them stay at home.

If your child is anxious on a more frequent basis, please get in touch with staff at the academy to see what support can be offered.

What does it mean if a child is persistently or severely absent?

Children who are registered at an academy but regularly fail to turn up are officially referred to as being 'persistently' or 'severely' absent.

Students who have missed more than 10% of possible sessions are considered persistently absent, whilst children who have missed more than 50% of sessions are referred to as severely absent.




The academy day is split into two sessions – the morning and the afternoon. Students who are late to the academy may miss the morning mark, so it is important that they are on time.

What time do students need to be at the academy by in the morning?

Students must attend for 8:30am to give them time to use the toilet and make use of the free breakfast club before attending form time, which starts at 8:40am. Students who arrive after 8:40am will receive a 'L' (late) mark. Students who attend after 9:30am will receive a U mark, which affects their attendance percentage and counts as an absence. For example, if a student

attends the academy every day for a year, and attends after 9:30am on one occasion, they would not be classed as having 100% attendance.



What should a parent/carer do if their child needs to be absent from the academy?

Parents/carers must contact the academy as early as possible to explain why their child is absent, for instance if they are too ill to attend.

If not, the academy will contact parents/carers on the first morning of an absence to find out why. All parents can request a 'leave of absence' (LOA) for their child which gives them permission to be absent from the academy.

All LOAs must be agreed with in advance by the Principal, Mrs Lloyd. In following the Department of Education's guide, permitted absence will only be granted in exceptional circumstances.

What rewards are in place for good attendance?

Research has shown that there is a clear link between attendance and attainment. Students with excellent attendance achieve better GCSE results. Therefore, the ultimate reward for students with good attendance is that they will see the benefit by fulfilling their potential and making good progress in their GSCE grades, the core purpose of the academy. This of course will give students more opportunities when applying for college, 6th form or apprenticeships. At Brownhills we feel it is important to show recognition for excellent attendance on a more frequent basis as follows:

- Weekly attendance reward merits on class charts
- £25 voucher draw for 100% attendance in last week of term (one per year group)
- £50 voucher draw for 100% per term (2 winners)
- Students with 100% for a week can win (2 winners in each year group):
 - Jump the queue pass (with one friend)
 - £1 voucher in the canteen
 - Free drink voucher from canteen
- Best form attendance trophy in assembly (weekly)
- End of Term 100% attendance certificates
- End of Term Rewards Trips

Brownhills Chess Club

This academic year, Mr. James has had the pleasure of developing Chess across all OAT academies. Consequently, Brownhills Ormiston Academy has also benefitted by giving students access to a variety of opportunities.

Firstly, there was the launch of a chess club leadership program. George Malpass, Jack Davies, Esme Morris and Amelia-Rose Grierson were all presented with chess club pin badges for their regular attendance at the chess club but also exhibiting strong leadership qualities.

In February, thirty-six primary school students from four academies participated in an exciting online chess tournament. The secondary school tournament was held in May with one hundred and twenty-four secondary school students from nine academies enthusiastically taking part in an online paired tournament. Brownhills Ormiston Academy was strongly represented with Jack Williams, Henry Grundy, Rachel Ball, Max Bagley, Jamie Jones, George Malpass, Kai Wheatly, Tabita Boziean, Jack Davies and Tariq Hayde all playing. All the Brownhills Ormiston Academy teams won at least one game and thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

Finally, there was the launch of 'Chess in the Community'. Each academy across the trust received a new chess board that can be lent out to students for home use. This initiative aims to promote family engagement through chess by allowing students to take the boards home.

A teacher from Edward Worlledge OAT Academy expressed gratitude for the generous donation of a large portable chess

board. The board brought immense joy to chess club students, especially one novice who took it home to play with his father, fostering meaningful family connections through the game of chess.

If anyone wants to borrow the Brownhills chess board, please come and find Mr. James, who will be more than happy for students to borrow it.

We hope that academic year 2024-25 brings lots more opportunities to play chess for fun and in competition.

He has introduced and promoted the world of chess to hundreds and thousands of students across all OAT schools- both primary and secondary.





Year 10 Geography Field Trip

French Play: Le Cours d'Art (The Art Lesson)

On the 17th June, our academy welcomed the Onatti Theatre Company, which was touring the UK. The Onatti Theatre Company is comprised of 3 French actors, who are performing in schools and other venues around the UK this year.

Over 150 of our Year 7, 8 and 9 students had the unique opportunity to watch the French play entitled 'Le Cours d'Art'.

The play was a comedy. It is about five students and a teacher in an art class. When the teacher leaves the lesson, she locks the door and gives the key to one girl. Not knowing that the girl has the key, all the other characters panic and turn on each other, becoming paranoid in the process and the comedy begins.

Our students thought that it was very entertaining, especially as the French actors interacted with the audience. The languages department thought that it was an exhilarating and a unique opportunity for students to immerse themselves in the French language, since the play was entirely performed in French.



Brownhills Culture Days- July 2024

This academic year, Mrs. Zaric and the school council are working on several projects:

A celebration that has happened for several years now is our "Culture Days". These focus on appreciating different cultural values and traditions. Each form decides on which country to represent. Their form rooms are decorated with items from that country; very often topped with a flag of their chosen country.



Throughout the 2-day event there is a plethora of activities that the students can get involved in, including different national sports.

We have Zumba dancing, Bhangra dancing, Aussie rules, French boules (bowls), Gaelic football, to name a few. Other activities include henna designs, which occur all week at lunchtimes with different foods from different countries on sale, so students can taste food they may not have tried before.

There will be a raffle to raise funds for charity to help children overseas.

Each form will take part in quizzes including the "Best dressed form room" competition where a trophy is won with pride. We look forward to students and staff getting involved to celebrate many cultures

Moon Samples and Meteorites from Mars Tour to our Academy

In the Science department during June, we were immensely lucky to have moon samples, which were brought back from the US Apollo moon missions in the 1960s and 1970s on loan from the US Government to our academy.

There is a long waiting list for UK schools and academies to loan these items. It was exciting when we had a pre-visit inspection from a representative from Leicester Space Museum, who had to ensure that our academy was secure to hold the invaluable and precious items from space.

We were able to look after meteorites from space, the moon and mars. Both the staff and students were incredibly excited to view the precious samples.



The students learnt about the different moon rocks and investigated how to identify meteorites from earth rocks. The activities sparked our students' scientific interest and raised their curiosity; they had so many questions. So, next time you see the moon remember our Brownhills students have held part it!
